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# **DIOCESAN SYNOD REPORT**

There were three meetings of the Diocesan Synod in 2022 in March, June and October.

In the March Synod, Bishop Alan spoke about the challenges facing the church as things began to return to normal after the pandemic both spiritual and financial and the need to encourage all people wherever they are on this journey. Bishop Michael spoke about the emerging crisis in the Ukraine and the rapid response being put in place to support the taking in of Ukrainian refugees. Bishop Richard spoke of the Racial Justice Action Group and the action plan they have been working on to counter racial and religious hate acts. An update was given on 'Living in Love and Faith' and a presentation was made by the Diocesan Environment Officer about the policy and actions plans they are working on towards the Diocese achieving the Bronze Award. Finally, the Chair of the Diocesan Board of Finance gave a report on the effects of the pandemic on the Diocesan finances and the work they were doing to mitigate this and the long-term effects of the reduction of funds.

In the June Synod, Bishop Alan spoke of the upcoming Lambeth Conference and reflected on the fact that there will be people attending from very different cultures and experiences. This should be an opportunity to listen and learn rather than be daunted by these differences. Bishop Michael gave a further update on the work of the Environment Group, the Policy and action plan. A report was given on the work being carried out on 'Clergy Wellbeing' which included the feedback from a survey of clergy that had been carried out. Bishop Richard spoke about the challenges and opportunities that were being presented by the considerable amount of new housing development that was taking place in various parts of the diocese, The Annual Reports from various boards were presented and accepted and a further update on the financial position of the diocese was presented. In the October Synod, Bishop Alan spoke about the energy crisis and the response from many churches and the support that the diocese could give to the provision of warm spaces. A further presentation was made by the Environment Group on the progress it had made with the action plan and how they were beginning to make this more detailed. A statement was made of the financial position of the diocese and how this was affecting the budget planning for next year. A presentation was made on the Reaching New People Impact Report indicating where there had been successes. The effect of the pandemic on this project was noted and how a New Pioneer Strategy was formed. Work continues on developing online support and resources for new initiatives.

# **DEANERY SYNOD REPORT**

Deanery Synod met three times, March, July and October 2022. There is always a business element to the meetings, such as Finance, but what follows here are other elements of the meetings.

The March meeting was held at Cople Church when Revd Lynne Sandle, Vicar, presided at a Eucharist Service.

We had a report from General Synod given by Sheila Bissell who was our newly appointed link to General Synod.

It was reported that Revd Matt Phillips would be leaving the Dunton Benefice on 27th March.

The Rural Dean informed Synod members that the suspension of the Riversmeet Benefice was being lifted and that he would be installed soon as Rector.

A reminder was given about the visit of David White, Diocesan Secretary, to the Deanery and members were encouraged to come to Sandy to meet him. In July, we met at Old Warden Village Hall when our speaker was Keith Williams from an organisation called 'Good News for Everyone'. He explained the history of this new organisation and that it had been created as part of a separation from the Gideon Bible Society. It is entirely UK based and endeavours to be very diverse in its membership. He spoke at length about their remit which included schools, prisons, other organisations and working at street level offering pupils and adults free copies of their publications, a range of which he brought with him for members to peruse in the refreshment break. He touched on some really moving stories of the depths of anguish some people had reached but then, with encouragement, picked up a bible and for many their lives were transformed. They are entirely self-funded and rely on donations and it is possible to join support groups.

Members were reminded about the need to submit nominations for the 2023 Deanery Project.

Our October meeting was held at St Andrew's Church in Biggleswade when we welcomed Ruth Janes, treasurer of the 'Malawi Orphan Fund' through whom our Deanery Project (Home of Hope in Malawi) money was being channelled. She, with her husband and some other supporters, had made a recent visit to Malawi and was pleased to give us an update on the home which was doing well despite economic pressures.

The Rural Dean presented her with a cheque for  $\pm 2,000$  which had been raised over an extended period of time due to the pandemic.

We had a report from General Synod given by Sheila Bissell.

There was only one nomination for Deanery Project 2023 which was for 'Chums Charity' and specifically The Bereavement and Nonbereavement Trauma Services dealing with children and young people. This had been proposed by Sandy and Julia Bickerdike gave a presentation on behalf of the parish. She used a real Case Study of a young girl suffering anxiety and other mental health issues to highlight the invaluable work Chums were doing. It was both interesting and quite moving.

Synod members were asked to approve a transfer of Revd Liz Lavelle (Dunton Benefice) to represent Biggleswade Deanery on Diocesan Synod.

# **CHURCH FABRIC AND GROUNDS**

It's been a busy year and while the heating replacement project has taken considerable time, the regular pattern of upkeep of our buildings and grounds continues.

With regard to the heating replacement project, we are now at the stage where we will seek DAC and planning approval to allow us to ask for tenders to do the work. At the same time we are now actively considering the fund raising of what will be a £200k project.

There have been some visible improvements:

- The installation of a curtain to the chancel alcove which originally housed the organ console.
- The introduction of some red cushioned chairs in the nave and chancel. These were retrieved from a redundant Methodist chapel. They have also been used to replace aged lounge chairs in the Ivel Room.

Work parties have tackled:

- The investigation of a leak in the heating system under the Trinity altar leading to a repair allowing the current heating system to get us through another winter.
- The repair of loose tiles in the nave.
- Leaf clearing and grounds maintenance spring and autumn.
- Cleaning of drains and roof gutters.

Particular thanks to Jan, Paul, Ruth, Vaughan and Hilary for regularly tending to their designated flower beds and borders.

Our garden of remembrance has been enhanced with the donation of two new benches and we are looking to improve the signage of this special area.

We have also kept pace with the five year programme of recommended works from our 2021 Quinquennial Inspection.

There are always fresh demands on our time and resources and we will need to prioritise them. In the short to medium term we will need to resurface our car park and further ahead engage with the net-zero-carbon agenda by considering new technologies. We also do face issues with the nave flooring caused by long term rot and the need for repairs resulting from work on the heating system.

Many thanks to every one who has given their time, talents and resources to the upkeep of our church.

Likewise, we welcome notification of the names and contact details of the sick, lonely, or increasingly frail, who would value the opportunity to receive Home Communions, or a pastoral visit.

In the last year a sub-group dealt very carefully, sympathetically and positively with one case which needed information to and discussion with our Vicar and Churchwardens. By following our policy, procedures, having good communications with all parties concerned, and applying all the normal appropriate checks, risk assessments and mitigation measures, we were able to continue with activities as hoped and planned.

The PCC continues to make Safeguarding one of its highest priorities. It is a standing item on all PCC agendas, and updated contact information for our team of six is displayed prominently in the entrance hall. Safeguarding information is readily available on our website.

As usual, I conclude by reminding you that we are all involved in caring for each other's safety, welfare and well-being. This does mean everyone must be alert! Thank you for continuing to be supportive, compliant, and vigilant!

# THE FRIENDS OF ST ANDREW'S

Membership of 'The Friends' now totals 155, which is a considerable drop in numbers over recent years. This is causing concern to the Trustees, who believe that the enormous contribution 'The Friends' make to the life of the church and the huge cost of keeping our beautiful church in good condition is not fully known.

The Trustees hope that we shall return to happier times when almost every member of the church family including their partners and children were members. Accordingly, in June, a campaign will be launched to achieve that aim.

At this point in time 'The Friends' have raised well over £400,000 for the care of the building. Most recently we made possible the

restoration of the organ with a grant of £24,000 and the installation of alarms of the roof to protect the lead. We have met the cost of a reprint of the booklets entitled 'Our Church Building and its History'. Sales of the first edition totalled £900 which we gave to the PCC. Now we are meeting the cost of the improved lighting both inside and outside the church.

There have been a number of changes to the membership of the Trustees body. Shirley Williams moved away to Somerset and we were all shocked and saddened by the sudden death of Jack Walters. Both gave devoted service in many ways and will be hard to replace. Derek Whinnett has given up his Chairmanship, a role in which he served most faithfully for ten years. Very much on the plus side, the Trustees were glad to welcome John Dilley as our new Chairman, the Revd Liz and Rosemary Bentley as ex-officio members, also Archie and Madeline Russell and Sylvia Rutt as elected members.

We celebrated the work of the Children's Society with music, readings, and prayer, as well as a poignant encircling of St Andrew's as the candles of the Christingles illuminated the church with hope for the future; some also joined us via Zoom. Ably assisted by Ben, John Dilley reminded us of the significance of the Christingle with a life-sized example during his address at the service! On the previous day, an enthusiastic team of all ages lead by Nicola Woodward, prepared 150 Christingles; not too many sweets and dried fruits were consumed by our young people during the construction process! With additional giving via our parish website, donations for the work of the Society amounted to a wonderfully generous total of **£460**.

Having recently taken on the role of the Parish co-ordinator for the Society, I wish to record our gratitude to Gill Hibbert who tirelessly and faithfully worked to raise funds for such deserving young people over so many years. We are thankful that she continues to support such a deserving charity, and is willing to offer her experience to me as I now fulfil this role.

#### **ST ANDREW'S SHOEBOXES**

We have now been sending shoeboxes to the Rotary Shoebox Appeal for three years. 2020 was not a good year to make the change from Operation Christmas Child as the Rotary Scheme runs somewhat differently to what we had been used to. Fund raising was virtually impossible and shopping for items for the boxes a challenge.

However, supporting the Rotary Scheme is now running smoothly, and people have commented favourably about being able to fill a 'Baby' or a 'Family' box as well as being able to choose the exact age of the child a box is for. Although the boxes are on the small side, by careful choice of contents, the boxes are still containing items for all categories, ie. hygiene, school stuff, toys, a hat and, of course a cuddly toy.

The gap Shirley Williams left when she moved from Biggleswade has thankfully been filled. I have two new members on the 'Shoebox Team' and several people already on the team have stepped in to fulfil new roles. Also, thankfully we have found a way to reduce the number of times the shoeboxes go in and out of the Chapter House loft.

I was unable to do my usual official launch last Autumn as it had been scheduled for the weekend that the Queen died, and I did wonder whether the number of boxes filled would suffer. In the event, our numbers were slightly up. Although the number of individual boxes filled remained the same as in 2022, namely 71, the number of communal boxes filled rose from 199 to 210, making a total of 281 boxes sent altogether. The increase in communal boxes is due to generous donations, which added up to £260, shopping at Boot Fayres and the donation of items for the boxes. Other sources of income were selling at Boot Fayres £185.00, Recycling used Canon and HP ink cartridges £37.00, sale of metal £81.60 and the Christmas Stall £81.00.

Our boxes were collected on the 29th November and I have now been told that they were sent to Albania.

I have already started buying for this year's communal boxes and expect to order the flat-pack boxes from Rotary towards the end of the summer term. My hope is that we can fill even more boxes this year. However, I have just learnt that, due to a huge increase in transport costs, because of the war in the Ukraine, the price of a shoebox has gone up for the first time in 10 years. They will now cost £3.00 each (and I will no longer get a discount for a bulk order as in the past). This will put a huge strain on the making of the communal boxes, as we will have to find at least an extra £300 to fill the same number of boxes. We need to find a way to make this happen if we can.

Thank you to all those who have continued to support the project by filling a box and to all whose generous donations helped to make last year's project such a success.

I'm pleased to report that the house remains in good order, both internally and externally, and while it provides the PCC with a steady regular income, hopefully it can help facilitate ministry within the parish in the future.

# PARTNERSHIP WITH 'HANDS AT WORK' AND THE COMMUNITY OF MAFAMBISA

We continue our partnership with 'Hands at Work' and the community of Mafambisa. 2022 was particularly special as we were again able to send a team to Mafambisa who spent valuable time connecting with both the Care Workers and also the children.

The Mafambisa care point now supports 75 vulnerable children from the community. This support takes the form of three Essential Services, namely a nutritious meal each day, access to education and access to basic health care.

Our 2022 team consisted of Carolyn, Jack, John, Lucy, Ben, Alice and Chris. We travelled by plane overnight to Johannesburg and then collected a minibus and drove the four hours across to the 'Hands at Work' hub near to White River. After settling in and our initial orientation at the Hub we went out on our first visit to Mafambisa (approximately 40 mins from the Hub).

We were really fortunate this year that Ben Dilley and Jack Marron joined our team. This is the first time that our team has had teenagers

under 18 and they were a complete blessing to the whole visit. They played continuously with the children, built their own relationships, joined in with the jobs that were needed, and led the singing in all the care points that we visited. Thank you Ben and Jack for making our visit so special.

When we arrived at Mafambisa we were excited to see the new children's shelter that had been recently built with monies raised by both Neptune Cub Pack and Edward Peake school. The shelter is a very large covered building that allows the children to shelter from both the rain and the sun. There is a concrete bench going all around the inside of the building that allows the children to sit and eat their food. The only issue was that it was so new that it hadn't yet been painted. So this was our task for the next two days. We needed to put on two primer coats and then two blue finish coats, on the building both inside and out. It was a big job, it is a big building (see the pictures on the Chapter House notice board).

#### Jack wrote this in our blog:

Please do bless us as we paint So the wall does not look so faint As we go on our way We all pray for a good day So here is a prayer for you to say Thank you Lord for being here today. Amen.

Today we had breakfast at 8 am and then set off to Mafambisa to paint the new shelter. It needed two coats of white paint on the outside before we could paint it blue. The inside had already been started but still needed a number of coats. Some of us (mum and I) were wearing quite a lot of it. The men started with the white paint whilst the ladies prepared spinach and beetroot which we had got the day before from the vegetable patches at Sommersett. The ladies prayed and praised with the care workers and then all of us were painting. By the time the children started arriving it was clear we wouldn't finish the painting – and we will continue with that tomorrow. After lunch of pap, chicken feet, spinach and beetroot we got the parachute out to play some games. The children laughed and shrieked. Ben and I then sang 'Shine' with the children and taught them 'Brill, Brill' and 'Be Happy' and they picked up the actions quickly. It was then time to go back to the hub, via pick and pay to pick up some bits for Care Workers appreciation day – tomorrow.

Each year that we have been out as a team we have been challenged to go deeper with the Care Workers, to share our faith, to understand more about them, to offer words of encouragement from the Bible and to relate these to their context. This is an important part of our visit and this year more than others it gave us an opportunity to re-connect with the Care Workers after the Pandemic.

The pandemic had seen changes in the Care Worker team for a variety of reasons. People having to move away, get different jobs, and other similar reasons, all as a result of the pandemic. So we were faced with some that we knew and had met before, but also new Care Workers, who had not met us, nor actually met a team before, as ours was the first since the pandemic. Each day we would sit with the Care Workers, before the children turned up, we would sing African worship songs, share passages of the Bible and pray together, we would share how we felt that day, any challenges that we had. This would form the basis of our prayer.

The ties that we now have with Mafambisa have grown and deepened, the partnership is working to the benefits of both communities. Our partnership changes lives. It gives comfort, brings safety, and brightens futures. Mafambisa is a community fractured by poverty and cycles of broken families and illness. This partnership has the ability and potential to break these cycles, to be radical in the love and security for the most vulnerable children of Mafambisa, and to transform lives and futures. Families are transformed, children are given opportunities that are only possible because of the financial support given by St Andrew's. These children are a wonderful investment. They are kind, passionate, enthusiastic about education, dreamers, and are extraordinarily grateful for everything and nothing.

Visiting Africa and visiting Mafambisa has a profound and long last impact of those who have made the journey, not least on our young people. The trips that we have made have often strengthened their faith and they have grown closer to God.

# Ben wrote this in our blog. – about a visit we made to a house, high up in the hills above Mafambisa.

Today Chris and I went off on a Holy Home visit in Mafambisa. We walked for about two hours up and over a mountain to learn more about this family's lifestyle. We went with two people from 'Hands' called Eunice and Prudence but also Kitsewe from the Mafambisa care-point.

When we arrived at this home we spent time with three of the seven people that live there. These were in their late teens and early twenties (19, 21 and 23). The 21 year old girl explained to us how they have three more siblings which are twins aged 8 years and then another sibling aged 11. The eldest of the three told us how their mum had left to stay with a new partner. She and the family used to live in Eswatini but her old partner was abusive so she left with her three younger kids to South Africa. The three we met had to make a decision of whether or not to stay in Eswatini with their dad – who wasn't taking good care of them or move to South Africa with her. The only problem with this is that they had Eswatini ID papers, so cannot work in South Africa unless it is a 'cash in hand job'. This meant they are now caring for their siblings in a small shack with only two beds for the six of them and sometimes seven when the mother comes home, this may be only once a month though. The house they are currently living in is small and isn't very secure and safe, especially for two eleven year olds and an eight year old. They don't have a front door, they only have a door to the second room which is the bedroom. This only has enough space for two mattresses and barely anything else. The house isn't made of bricks but made of scrap metal and wood making it unstable and leaving the children and young adults vulnerable.

We pray that this family find safety in South Africa and listen to God in how they may walk their path through these tough challenges. We pray God brings them hope when times are not going well and they use that hope to overcome the hard situation. May we pray they can find a job and continue to work as a family in order to build a bigger house and feel more at home in where they are.

We are also fortunate that our church schools, Edward Peake and St Andrew's East and West also support this partnership. Pupils have fund raised for Mafambisa through non-uniform days and most recently a fun run at St Andrew's East which raised in excess of £4500. Last year's efforts at Edward Peake contributed to the building of the new children's shelter.

As a Church we are currently support 15 children through our annual mission payments, but this rises to around 45 children when individual donors from the congregation, from our church schools and others with a connection are added. We are very grateful for this, and we know that it makes a significant difference in Africa.

There is always opportunity for more people to contribute to the community by sponsoring a child and there is also opportunity for others to visit Mafambisa and obviously we can all continue to pray for the community, the care workers, the children, the care givers and the Hands community that support them.

#### YOUTH AND CHILDREN'S GROUPS

St Andrew's continues to offer a wide variety of groups for our children and young people. All through the past two years we have taken opportunities that we could to engage with our children and young people via zoom or in-person. As we now come out of Covid we have taken the opportunity to re-align our youth groups.

On Sunday mornings during our 10 am worship we run our Sunday school which caters for children virtually from birth until early teens. Our band regularly plays for the family service on the first Sunday of the month.

We currently run three youth groups for young people – two on a Thursday evening and one on Sunday evening, for young people aged from the age of about nine through to 18+. These are programme-based youth groups and give our young people and those from the community a chance to meet together in a Church setting with Christian leaders to do a variety of activities. At the end of each term, these youth groups meet together for a youth activity, which is followed by a disco, BBQ or wide game depending upon the time of year. These groups currently cater for a total of about 30 young people.

During the autumn of 2022, a group of young people met each week on a Sunday after church to follow the Youth Emmaus course in preparation for confirmation. We also had one young person who wanted to be admitted to Communion who also followed a course. We were pleased to welcome Bishop Richard to a service of both acceptance and confirmation, where Frankie was accepted into Communion and Freya, Oscar, Ruby, Xavier and Jack were confirmed.

St Andrew's also supports four uniformed groups of Guides, Brownie Guides and Rainbows who meet regularly during term time and occasionally attend our monthly Family Service.

In the summer for four days, we run our Holiday Club that operates for about 160 children and gives a variety of activity, games and crafts wrapped up with singing and learning about characters and stories from the Bible. The theme in 2022 was 'The Diary of a Disciple' which looked at stories from Luke's Gospel. The Week concluded with a Sunday service of praise, which brought together around 200 people for a service followed by a BBQ.

You will find reports within this booklet for most of these groups. Obviously to be able to run this level of youth and children's activities requires a large number of children and young people's workers. I would like to express on behalf of St Andrew's, my thanks for all the hard work these people put in this vital work.
